CONCEPTION OF ST. ANN.

The very ancient cult of the most Holy Mother of God, a characteristic mark of the Eastern



Church, is especially manifested in the great wealth of Marian feast in the Liturgical Year. These feasts present to us the more important moments in the life of the Mother of God, from her Immaculate Conception to the moment of her Assumption into Heaven.

How wonderfully God prepared her who was to be the Mother of our Savior. She..full of grace, holy, and immaculate became the worthy tabernacle, in which the Son of God dwelt. Our ancient Slavonic Prologue contains the following for the Feast of the Conception of St. Ann: "Beloved, today is the beginning of our salvation. In the

womb of Ann, after the Annunciation of the angel, the grand-daughter of the Just Jesse is conceived, and know, that we are celebrating the Conception of our Lady the Most Pure Queen... Mother of our God. Therefore, let us celebrate the holy Conception of the Most Pure Lady the Mother of God devoutly and with joy, for She unceasingly prays to her Son and our God for us.

Today the bonds of barrenness are loosed, for God has heard the prayers of Joachim and Anna. He promised, beyond hope, the birth of their Godly daughter. The Indescribable, Himself, born of her a mortal, commanded us through the angel to sing to her Rejoice, O woman full of grace, the Lord is with you.

SAINT NICHOLAS

It is the image of St. Nicholas, more often than that of any others, that is found on Byzantine



seals; and he is said to have been represented by Christian artists more frequently than any saint except our Lady. The popularity of St. Nicholas, especially among our people is based on the fact that he embodied that concept of Christianity which has always been taught, lived and practiced by the Eastern Church. There are several virtues attributed to St. Nicholas, among which faith, charity and willingness to help excel above all.

For our people St. Nicholas is a champion of faith, a "model of faith" as the Troparion calls him. From all virtues ascribed to St. Nicholas, charity is mentioned pre-eminently. It is this example of our patron saint which we must follow today better than ever before. In a world which hates, we must be souls of love. We must teach the world again how to love, by loving. It is always the lack of charity among

men which is responsible for the sad condition of humanity. Love is not a spectacular virtue. It manifests itself in little things done.

The charity of St. Nicholas was all-embracing. He made no exceptions nor did he set precedents. Christians of today would do well to imitate this universal charity. If we really love St. Nicholas, let us imitate him in sincerely practicing the virtue of charity as he did. St. Nicholas was a man who helped others. He stands before us as an example and symbol of compassion and willingness to help those in need.

Human nature being what it is, prone to be lazy, unstable and emotional, man requires the promise of reward, or the threat of punishment, in order to help others or, generally, in order to strive for perfection. Children try harder when they know that some reward awaits them as compensation for their efforts. In this respect, we are as children, of a second growth. Charity must be completely disinterested.

According to a Latin Proverb, the Saints are to be admired rather than imitated. Spiritually we cannot profit by mere admiration of Saints; we must imitate them. And the one who should be particularly imitated in our time is St. Nicholas.

"We praise you, O bishop of Christ, Nicholas, and we venerate your memory, for you pray for us to Christ our God."
